A Note from Pastor Holly

Greeting KCC Family,

We are well on our way down the path of Lent, approaching Holy Week at the end of this month. The Lenten journey has offered us many opportunities to engage in some of Jesus' infamous planting parables. We are reminded of the miracles that happen all around us and listen for the call to continue to tend the soil of our own lives so that the love-seed of God can grow abundantly.

I hope that you have all had a chance to plant your Lenten plants. Much to my surprise, my Lenten plant is eagerly sprouting! I find that fascinating for a plant trying to grow in a cold, East Coast February. I watch as the little shoots push their way confidently through the soil and stretch in the direction of the sun. Instinctively, they bend toward the sunlight – even when I turn them around in the other direction! The windowsill that they occupy is abuzz with new life, right before our very eyes!

And like our little Lenten plants, the Lenten journey itself allows us to grow toward the Son as well. As we locate ourselves in the parables that Jesus shared, we seek to gain a whole new perspective on how our faith grows. If we lean on God's everlasting arms and recognize that each and every one of us have been called to bloom, we will break through the barriers that try and stop us and we will flower. And the best news, is that we will all flower differently! I may flower early and have green buds. You may flower later and have yellow buds. Some of us bloom for a long time, some of us step into our

glory for short bursts of time. Each of us will find the Son, and peak into all that we are called to be at a time that God needs us the most. And we will do so because if God's infinite creativity, for we are each fearfully and wonderfully made.

The great news about recognizing that we all bloom differently is understanding that we each have a part to play – that this life isn't a one person show. We all need to bloom and we all need to bloom differently so that God's love is evident at different times, by different people, when it is most needed. These blooms, mind you, are no accident, they are timed, they are watered and nourished, they are called forth by God to flower the earth with more love and open arms that we can ever imagine.

If we can see Lent as a time where we open ourselves to internal exploration and preparation for the new things God can do with our short lives, perhaps Lent can find a new and meaningful place in our faith life. It is a time to be willing to release the things that are holding us back and be open to the wonderful new ways God is calling us to sprout and bloom in this world. With a disposition of selfreflection and openness, the ways to love one another are endless!

Friends, our lives, our time here on earth, are like bulbs, loved and created and cared for by God. Easter is coming, it is time to bloom!

February is Black History Month: The 29th Connecticut


Black History Month is an annual celebration of achievements by African Americans and a time for recognizing their central role in U.S. history. This year, we were thrilled to have had 3 cofounders of the Berlin B.E.A.T. come to our first Lenten Potluck on Tuesday, February 20th and present the award-winning documentary, *The 29th Connecticut Regiment and the Fight for Freedom*.

The 29th Connecticut is a short documentary film about the eleven African American soldiers who enlisted from Berlin, Connecticut, during the American Civil War. The 29th Regiment of United States Colored Troops, formed just after Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation, fought in critical battles near the end of the war and helped to secure freedom from enslavement for all United States citizens.

As a result of the fruitful conversation following the viewing of the film, we learned that there are several names of African American soldiers of the civil war, specifically from the 29th Connecticut regiment, that are *not* included on The Kensington Soldiers' Monument, the historic war memorial erected in 1863 that is located on the church property at the corner of Percival and Sheldon. The Kensington Soldiers' Monument is one of the oldest memorials to the <u>American Civil War</u> in the United States, and the first to be erected in Connecticut.

KCC will be working alongside B.E.A.T. and the Berlin Historical Society to confirm their names and add them to the monument. We are hopeful to celebrate the addition of these names to the monument on either Memorial Day or on Juneteenth of this year. We pray that by doing so, monuments around the country will seek to discover and include any names of African American soldiers that were not recognized.

If you missed the viewing of this amazing film at our Lenten Supper, don't worry, you can watch it anytime at https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=7ch0nWg3kwl. The 29th Connecticut was produced by the Wide Awake Film Company and the BEAT Berlin Civil War Heroes Project. This film won Best Connecticut Film at the Mystic Film Festival in 2023!
